### **Thematic Areas of Student GLP Research**

Approved by the partnering institutions.

#### 1. Trade and Financing for Development (mentor: Prof Manuela Totora, PhD)

Financing for Development & Trade at national and international levels as a research theme explores mechanisms and policies for mobilizing financial resources to support sustainable development and trade. It examines investment strategies, economic policies, and international cooperation to promote economic growth, reduce poverty, and enhance global trade relations in specific national or international context.

# 2. Social Inclusion and Human Dignity: Decent Work & Economic Rights (mentor: Prof. Lichia Saner-Yiu, EdD.)

The research theme "Decent Work and Economic Rights at Enterprise, National, and International Levels" examines policies and practices designed to ensure fair wages, safe working conditions, and workers' participatory rights. It investigates the implementation and impact of the Decent Work Agenda and related economic rights across various scales, fostering social justice, economic inclusion, and equitable workforce opportunities. Contributions in the form of case studies focusing on specific aggregated levels (e.g., company, country, or region) are particularly welcomed.

## 3. Environmental Sustainability and Responsible Consumption and Production (mentor: Prof Yu-Chia Ko, PhD)

The research theme "Environmental Sustainability" investigates practices and principles aimed at preserving natural resources and ecosystems within planetary boundaries for future generations. It explores the equilibrium among ecological integrity, economic development, and social well-being, with the objective of achieving an economy that simultaneously supports environmental conservation and human progress. Case studies examining these dimensions at specific aggregated levels (e.g., company, country, or region) are encouraged.

### 4. Resilient and Sustainable Cities (mentor: Prof Raymond Saner, PhD)

The research theme "Resilient and Sustainable Cities," inclusive of cybersecurity considerations, explores strategies and technologies that enable urban areas to effectively manage increasing population growth and rising demands for public services, essential infrastructure, and employment opportunities. Future cities must also be capable of withstanding and recovering from cyber threats and associated vulnerabilities. Cybersecurity, as a crucial element of contemporary urban life, focuses on safeguarding critical infrastructure, ensuring data protection, and maintaining uninterrupted public services amidst growing digital risks and cyber-attacks, thereby enhancing overall urban resilience in the digital era.

### 5. Stakeholder Engagement and Partnership (mentor: Prof Cecile Molinier)

The research theme "Stakeholder Engagement and Partnership for Inclusive and Sustainable Development" explores collaborative processes involving diverse actors—including communities, businesses, civil society, and governments—in decision-making and implementation efforts toward sustainable outcomes. It investigates effective mechanisms and strategies for meaningful stakeholder participation, emphasising inclusive governance, transparency, and accountability. Research under this theme aims to identify best practices and partnership models that drive equitable, inclusive, and lasting development impacts aligned with sustainability goals.

Upon successful completion of the GLP coursework and submission of the final group project report, participants will receive a certificate issued by CSEND.
